




HISTORY EXHIBIT AT THE LITTLETON MUSEUM



- 2005: Littleton Museum expansion/renovation opens including Spirit of Community history exhibit
- No extensive updating since the history exhibit opened
- 2022: Community engagement revealed a desire to retain traditional histories and a strong need to add untold stories of under-represented groups and communities
- **2024:** Additional focus groups confirmed need to update exhibit and add untold stories





CONCEPT MASTER PLAN

Process


- In 2024, Studio Tectonic was selected to create a concept master plan for the history gallery revisioning and expansion
- Site visits to area museums
- Focus groups and discovery meetings conducted by Studio Tectonic with community and stakeholders
- Timeline Towers and Thematic Nodes established in collaboration with Museum staff
- Preliminary artifacts and storylines identified in collaboration with Museum staff
- Concept Master Plan delivered in January 2025


Outcome

Parfleche This parfleche may be from the Kiowa tribe.




Miner's Pan Sluice pans were used by prospector's early in Colorado's gold rush as an easy way to locate gold in placer deposits.

Bench

This section of log was taken from John McBroom's cabin, and later made into a bench around 1858.







Area Big Idea

 Preceding the discovery of gold in Cherry Creek was a Littleton of the past that was rich with life, human experiences, and periods that set the foundation for the community of Littleton today. These past moments still resonate with our lived experiences.

Manual burr-mill coffee grinders were used in American homes from c.1895 to c.1930.








Area Big Idea

 The area began to transition from a collection of farms and homesteads to a town when homesteader Richard Little subdivided and plated his land, laying the foundation for Littleton. The **arrival of the railroad**, which carried crops from area farms to growing cities like Denver, helped ensure the fledgling town's success.







High Engagement Element—IRRIGATION

Visitors learn about the importance of irrigation through a playful interactive. They may use the small head-gate wheel to raise and lower small, model headgates. The wheel changes the flow on the video screen and shows how Littleton's water users send the


