Pavement Preservation A Path to Success



Like any strategic program identification of key assets, resources, and obstacles is essential to success. Littleton last updated the PCI assessment in 2014 and shelved the proposed work plan. Forward progress over time requires utilizing the best available tools to build a plan for improvement.

CRACKSEAL

Best in class cities deliver pavement and infrastructure preservation and enhancement plans on time, within budget, and of the highest attainable quality. Leaders have a program, work the plan, and fund it appropriately for project success, providing community transparency on project selection, delivery, and funding.

LIFECYCLE MANAGEMENT



Pavement preservation is the glue of efficient roadway infrastructure – Crack seal, slurry and chip seal, cold and hot-in-place recycling, and mill and overlay are essential tools.

Reconstruction is often necessary in two cases: structural or functional obsolescence. This is by far the most expensive tool at approximately \$1,300,000/mile versus \$6,000/mile for other preservation techniques.

2018 Trends

- 54,000 lane miles managed by Local Agencies captured in this survey.
- Representing 83% of Local Agency asphalt paved roads statewide.
- Over \$247 M budgeted for Annual Street Improvement Programs.
- 65% of agencies reported increased funding for their program vs. 2017.
- Mill & Overlay programs increased funding on average +19% vs. 2017.
- Maintenance programs increased funding on average +12% vs. 2017.
- CIP programs increased funding on average +21% vs. 2017.
- Funding \$/lane mile increased +5.6% from \$4,342 to \$4,588 in 2018.


