Unification with South Metro **Fire Rescue** for improved emergency services and high quality roads

BACKGROUND

Previous discussion highlights

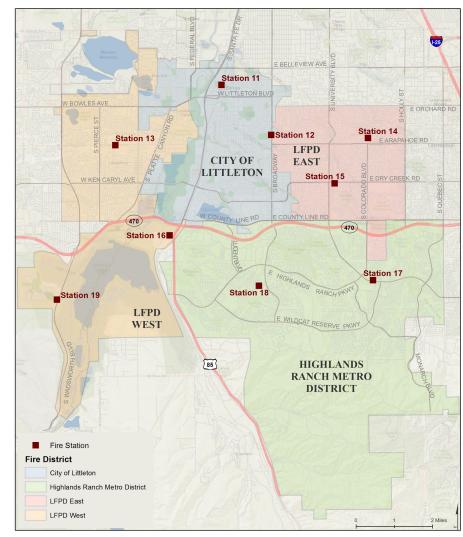
- <u>11/28/2017</u> City Manager and Attorney present to council the partners letter to terminate the fire partnership.
- <u>12/05/2017</u> Council study session; various fire-service options discussed. Council advises staff to pursue discussions/negotiations with SMFR.
- <u>02/03/2018</u> Council Workshop; Fire services are discussed with council as a part of long-term financial sustainability. City Manager and Finance Director discuss a methodology to pay for services, supported by council.

CURRENT FIRE SERVICE

This system ends December 31, 2018

- **7** Engines
- 2 Ladder Trucks
- 1 Battalion Chief



PLANNED DISTRICT BOUNDARIES

The new boundaries that formed when our partners joined SMFR created shared borders between the City and SMFR allowing for more efficient service.

KEY DECISION FACTORS



Pre-Inclusion Highlights

 <u>Recital H</u> - The ultimate goal is to have a single, unified fire protection district to provide fire department services to the communities, citizens, and property of SMFR, COL, HRMD, LFPD and Cunningham

• <u>Section 1(a)</u> - Creation of a single, integrated district requires a vote of the people

• <u>Section (1) (iv)(vi)</u>- SMFR with COL will determine a date for the first election

Pre-Inclusion Highlights

Continued

 Section 1(vii) - SMFR and COL will split (50% ea) the cost of conducting the election and public education and consulting services for the City election

• Section 1(c) - Transfer of assets

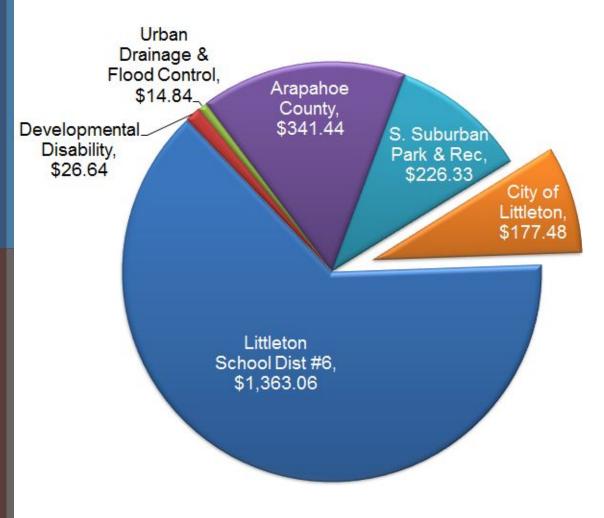
• Section 2(a) - COL shall become a member of the Fire Authority and be entitled to one voting seat

• Section 2 (e) - The intent is that ALL Littleton Fire Rescue personnel will become employees of the Fire Authority on January 1, 2019

Current annual residential property tax.

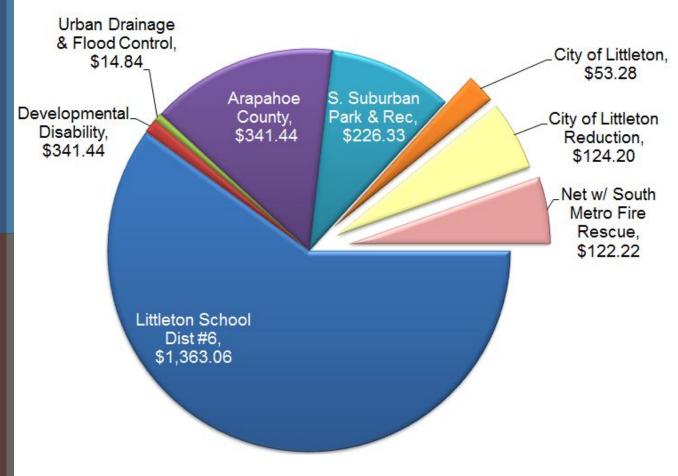
Property tax example based on median home price of \$370K.

NET CHANGE FOR **COMMERCIAL**

Property tax example based on median commercial property value of \$1M.



FIRE COSTS

The city no longer pays for fire services.

\$7.1M

Fire costs eliminated





PROPERTY TAX REVENUES

Property tax revenues to the city are decreased. \$4.0M

City mill levy reduced from 6.662 to 2.0



IMPROVED ROADS

A portion of sales tax funding currently dedicated to fire service would be directed to City streets and infrastructure improvements. \$3.1M

annual funds to be allocated to roads and infrastructure



THE FINANCIAL SIDE LONG TERM

REVENUES

- Reduction in property tax revenues to the city

 partially offsets increased property taxes to
 property owners
- Reduction in Specific Ownership Tax
- Lockheed Martin/Meadowbrook contracts will be addressed
- Loss of administrative fee from the fire partners
- Other

THE FINANCIAL SIDE **LONG TERM**

EXPENSES

- No Fire costs
- Dispatch contract will be terminated and part of inclusion measure
- No future fire capital costs/repairs/maintenance for apparatus or stations
 - Exception: Station 11 ownership to remain with City of Littleton
- Dedicated funding for capital and infrastructure
- Other

THE FINANCIAL SIDE **ONE TIME**

EXPENSES

- Personnel vacation/comp time buyout
- Required payoff of radio and platform truck leases
- Share in election costs

THE FINANCIAL SIDE **OTHER**

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- City-wide administrative support provided for the fire department
- Reduction in General Fund fund balance reserve requirement
- Transfer of EMS net position to general fund

THE FINANCIAL SIDE SUMMARY
