


EXCEPTIONAL FIRE SERVICES

QUOTES FROM PREVIOUS STUDIES

2008 Operational Efficiency Study

- Future <u>Challenges</u> for LFR
 - Fiscal realities of increasing costs and unpredictable revenues
 - Service level goals
 - LFR Partners with questions about service, costs, and governance

2013 Operational Feasibility Study - Strategies

- Status Quo "... does not believe this is a viable strategy..."
- Formation of a New Fire Protection District
 - "Englewood, Littleton, HRMD, and LFPD is not feasible..."
- Link with an Existing Fire Authority
 - This strategy was not studied

KEY DECISION FACTORS

- Long-term cost savings
- International accreditation
- Better response times
- Improved ISO rating
- Firefighters may retain position
- Funds for street and infrastructure

PRE-INCLUSION HIGHLIGHTS

- Recital H The ultimate goal is to have a single, unified fire protection district to provide fire department services to the communities, citizens, and property of SMFR, COL, HRMD, LFPD, and Cunningham
- <u>Section 1(a)</u> Creation of a single, integrated district requires a vote of the people
- Section (1) (iv)(vi)- SMFR with COL will determine a date for the first election

PRE-INCLUSION HIGHLIGHTS

Continued

- Section 1(vii) SMFR and COL will split (50% each) the cost of conducting the election and public education and consulting services for the City election
- Section 1(c) -Transfer of assets
- Section 2(a) COL shall become a member of the Fire Authority and be entitled to one voting seat
- Section 2 (e) The intent is that ALL Littleton Fire Rescue personnel will become employees of the Fire Authority on January 1, 2019

CHANGES SINCE THE STUDY SESSION

Changes since 3/13/2018 .

 Section 1 (v) clarify that changes in mill levy as the result of inclusion do not occur until January 2020

 Section 2 (d) (e) clarify leasing of property if the city is a member of the Fire Authority

 Section 2 (m) address environmental responsibilities for above ground fuel tanks


Changes since 3/13/2018, continued.

 Section 1 (vii) Subsequent inclusion elections may be by mail or polling place and will be determined at the time of calling the election

 Section 1 (vii) (e) (i) addresses the existing service agreement between the City and Lockheed Martin Space Systems


 Section 1 (vii) (e) (ii) addresses the termination of the existing service agreement between the City and the Meadowbrook Metropolitan District

CURRENT PROPERTY TAX ALLOCATION


Currently, the City of Littleton receives 8% of property tax paid.



CHANGES TO PROPERTY TAX ALLOCATION

With unification, the city will receive 2% and SMFR will receive 11% of total property taxes paid.

Net increase 4.588 Mills 6% of total



NET CHANGE FOR RESIDENTS

Based on median home price of \$370,000.

NET CHANGE FOR COMMERCIAL

Based on commercial property value of \$1M.



CHANGE IN CITY FUNDING

Inclusion allows reallocation of funds to streets and infrastructure.

\$7.1M Fire costs

- \$4.0M Property tax reduction

\$3.1M Improved streets

FUTURE OF FIRE SERVICE

The vote in November will determine how our community pays for fire service.

2019 - Year One

- City contracts with SMFR through Fire Authority
- City pays from General Fund Reserves

FUTURE OF FIRE SERVICE

Continued

The vote in November will determine how our community pays for fire service.

2020 & Beyond

- Voters approve inclusion
 - Improved fire services and street maintenance
 - Property Tax Change on January 1, 2020
- Voters do not approve inclusion
 - City contracts with SMFR at 9.25 mill equiv.
 - Additional \$1.4 million from the General Fund
 - Reduction of reserves
 - Requires review of city-wide operating costs
 - No additional funds for street maintenance

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Approval of the Inclusion agreement:

- Timing is critical
 - Service delivery
 - Cost implications
- No other options provide similar service for the cost of SMFR
- Standalone or contract option are not financially & operationally viable
- A long-term, financially stable approach
- Future Fire Service increases would require a vote of the entire SMFR District
- Redirects General Fund Revenue to a critical public need street maintenance
