30	communities to address traffic congestion, maintenance needs, and safety concerns; and		
31	WIFDEAS the feilure to maintain reads and bridges adequately costs		
32 33	WHEREAS, the failure to maintain roads and bridges adequately, costs Coloradans on average of \$468 per driver due to damage and unnecessary wear-and-tear to

36	WHEREAS, truly addressing Colorado's transportation challenges requires a		
37	dedicated, sufficient, and guaranteed stream of revenue; and

39	WHEREAS, a bipartisan, coalition of local elected officials, business leaders,		
40	labor unions, environmentalists, transit groups, and community activists have joined together to		
41	ask voters to raise the State sales tax by .62 percent, or about six cents on a ten-dollar purchase,
