7	A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF
8	LITTLETON, COLORADO, ENDORSING THE FRAMEWORK PLAN
9	FOR THE HIGH LINE CANAL
10	
11	WHEDEAS the High Line Court's 71 mean lating with an exitable incompany to
12	WHEREAS , the High Line Canal's 71 meandering miles are vitally important to the region's sitizant and environmental health with over 250,000 residents resident within one
13 14	the region's citizens and environmental health with over 350,000 residents residing within one mile of the Canal, and more than 500,000 people using the Canal each year; and
14 15	nine of the Canal, and more than 500,000 people using the Canal each year, and
16	WHEREAS, through unprecedented interjurisdictional collaboration, cities,
17	counties and agencies along the High Line Canal have worked together in recognition of the
18	need to plan for the future of the Canal; forming the High Line Canal Working Group, initiated
19	by Arapahoe County and entered into the High Line Canal Working Group Statement of Purpose
20	(attached as Exhibit A); and
21	
22	WHEREAS, the High Line Canal Core Management Team was established in
23	2012 (members include Denver Water, Arapahoe County, the City of Aurora, the City and
24	County of Denver, Douglas County, and the High Line Canal Conservancy) with the purpose to
25	coordinate and catalyze the varied planning process while working toward the primary objective
26	to achieve maximum possible beneficial public use/s for the Canal; and
27	
28	WHEREAS, as the Canal owner, Denver Water has enabled the region's
29	recreational use of the Canal Trail for nearly 50 years and has supported the High Line Canal
30	Conservancy and the governmental partners in stewarding the development of the Plan for the
31 32	High Line Canal; and
33	WHEREAS, in 2016, Douglas County, Highlands Ranch Metropolitan District,
34	the City of Littleton, the City of Centennial, Arapahoe County, South Suburban Parks and
35	Recreation District, the City of Greenwood Village, the City of Cherry Hills Village, the City
36	and County of Denver, the City of Aurora, joined together with Denver Water and the High Line
37	Canal Conservancy to support an extraordinary and diverse public outreach process reaching
38	over 100,000 citizens, and engaging over 3,500 residents resulting in the regionally supported
39	2017 High Line Canal Community Vision Plan (the "Vision Plan"); and
40	
41	WHEREAS, after an 18 month process, community and stakeholder groups, The
42	Conservancy, Denver Water, and committed local governmental partners, have created the Plan
43	for the High Line Canal: New Life for a Regional Legacy ("the Plan"); and
44	
45	WHEREAS, the Plan represents a community vision to honor, enhance, and

repurpose a landmark of our agricultural heritage into one of our region's premier green spacesconnecting neighborhoods and people to nature and each other; and

- WHEREAS, the Plan's highest purpose is to safeguard the historic waterway while reclaiming the Canal as a regional greenway for future generations. The Plan lays out strategies and clear guidance for re-purposing the Canal, improving the health of people and the environment, and increasing accessibility and enjoyment for generations to come; and
- 54 **WHEREAS**, the Plan priorities promote public health through improved access, 55 safety, and quality of experience; environmental health ensuring the canal is a thriving natural 56 corridor; the canal's new life as a green infrastructure/stormwater management system; and 57 honoring the canal's history and promoting its educational potential; and 58
- WHEREAS, the Plan is aspirational, long-range and regional in focus. The Plan's
 horizon extends 15 years and beyond to guide future considerations, while addressing current
 priorities, too; and
- WHEREAS, the Plan provides guidance for intergovernmental collaboration and
 framework for how through cooperation along with public and private partnerships, we can
 implement the Plan and fulfill the community vision for the Canal; and
- 67 **WHEREAS,** the Plan respects local planning and budgeting. The Plan was 68 developed with guidance from local jurisdictions and Denver Water; however, it does not replace 69 the vision individual communities, but instead it serves as a tool to promote regional vision and 70 cooperation. The plan in no way financially obligates or commits local governments and 71 agencies to the proposed plans and enhancements; and
- WHEREAS, the Plan provides a visionary roadmap toward a vibrant future
 encourages communities to work together. Many of the challenges and needed enhancements
 along the Canal such as noxious weeds, wildlife impacts, and stormwater -- don't recognize
 jurisdictional boundaries and local governments must work collaboratively to address them. This
 Plan provides the framework for coordinated region-wide efforts toward implementation.

The High Line Canal Working Group is a collaborative effort to secure funding for - and implement - projects that will help enhance and protect the unique recreation experience along the High Line Canal.

The High Line Corridor be protected forever as an intimate treasure and continuous recreation experience along a historic, naturally scenic Canal.

- To agree to collaborate as we are more effective together than individually; and
- To a long-term effort that ensures a legacy for future generations.
